Effective Parent Conferences: What To Do and What Not To Do

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Do	Don't
Make "happy calls" and send "happy-grams" to parents of difficult students	Dwell on student's mistakes when reporting to parents
Prepare reports summarizing student's progress	Allow parents to focus on student's mistakes
Emphasize strengths	Argue with parents
Explain and seek agreement with parents on your action plan	Ask parents to monitor or consequate school teacher-student behavior issues or in-school assignments
Ask parents to let you know of changes in student behavior that they notice	Keep student "in the dark," fostering suspicion or fear
Meet with student before parent-teacher conference	Permit parents to attack their student
Protect student self-esteem in parent-teacher conference	Think you have to handle every difficult situation yourself
Consult parents as resources	Rush toward quick solutions
Use reflective listening, especially when parents are upset	Overlook parents' strengths
Request presence of counselor or principal if you think you expect a difficult conference	Make assumptions about nontraditional families before getting to know them
